October 11 – Cherokee Nation visits. Guests filled the Archives' reading room to welcome an official visit by two leaders from the Cherokee Nation in Tahlequah, Oklahoma. Cherokee Nation Secretary of State Chuck Hoskin, Jr., and the Honorable Jack D. Baker presented the Archives with a check for \$25,000 to support the publication of additional volumes of *Records of the Moravians*

Volume Seven of Records: Cherokees, covering 1825-1827, was published in September, and is now available for holiday giving from our Web site.

Among the Cherokees. Salem College alumna Anna Smith, a descendant of Chief Renatus Hicks, an early convert at the Springplace mission, later hosted a reception for our guests at her home. Smith and Baker founded the Cherokee Moravian Historical Association in 2005 in part to spur the translation of the missionary records behind *Records:* Cherokees. Since 2008, the Archives' Cherokee Fund has received more than \$360,000 in gifts to create the series.

Dr. Grant McAllister, professor in the Department of German and Russian at Wake Forest University, was our guest lecturer on the occasion of the 500th Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation. McAllister's talk focused on October 31, 1817, a day in the life of the Salem congregation. His complete transcription of the Salem diary of 1817 will be the nexus of future studies from the Archives.

August 17 – Archives attends opening of Old Salem "Hidden Town" project. Although we have not been directly involved in the effort to date, Old Salem staff has used Archives' records to "reveal the history of a hidden town of African enslaved and freedman people living in Salem—where they lived, worked, and who they were as human beings." One of the first sites being developed is Davy's house, adjacent to Cedarhyrst and the Archives.
